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Update-Changes made to the systems of controls.

- 5) Maintain enhanced cleaning, including cleaning frequently touched surfaces often, using standard products such as detergents.
- 6) Consider how to minimise contact across the site and maintain social distancing wherever possible.
- 7) Keep occupied spaces well ventilated.
- 8) Ensure individuals wear the appropriate personal protective equipment (PPE) where necessary.
- 9) Promote and engage in asymptomatic testing, where available.
- 10) Promote and engage with the NHS Test and Trace process.
- 11) Manage and report confirmed cases of coronavirus (COVID-19) amongst the school community.
- 12) Contain any outbreak by following local health protection team advice.

- -anyone who has had any of the following types of contact with someone who has tested positive for COVID-19
- -face-to-face contact including being coughed on or having a faceto-face conversation within one metre.
- -been within one metre for one minute or longer without face-to-face contact.

The school identifies close contacts of the staff member/pupil to self-isolate based on a positive LFD. If a confirmatory PCR comes back as negative and close contacts have no symptoms, then they can stop isolating.
